

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CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT:

I can't believe it has been another year that has come and gone.

There are ten key elements I want to focus on - in random order:

FIRST KEY ELEMENT -GOVERNMENT PROPOSAL

An update on the proposal we gave the Ministry of Social Services on Trusteeship - which means trusteeship for people with disabilities on Social Assistance. The report was very labour intensive. Currently the government is reviewing all trusteeship services in Saskatchewan. After the review, a snapshot and recommendation for such services will be presented to the Ministry of Social Services. We both agree these types of services are lacking in Regina specifically. We think the Voice is an obvious choice to deliver trusteeship services, primarily for people on SAID. Our proposal will be presented when the formal request for proposals is released by the Ministry. Service delivery contracts will be announced for the 2014-2015 budget year. This was the message from government.

SECOND KEY ELEMENT - GALA EVENT

The Gala Committee is working diligently. The invitations were sent out before the end of March, along with inviting our alumni (long-time members). We are having a dinner for approximately 100 people. The office dedicated time and energy to make this event memorable. Press release was sent out for print, radio and TV. Marg Friesen has arranged for a dynamitic MC & guest speaker. A program was sent out in advance.

THIRD KEY ELEMENT - GIRL POWER CAMPS

Amber-Joy Boyd will continue doing the camps for us. There were two camps done one in each- Regina & Saskatoon.

FOURTH KEY ELEMENT - RDSP

Bev Duncan has been doing RDSPs - Registered Disability Saving Plans. One scheduled presentation for NSILC audience at their AGM on Thursday, June 19th.

FIFTH KEY ELEMENT - BOARD MEMBERS

Welcome to our newest Board Member - Sherry Karpa. She joins us from Indian Head. She will be very busy along with being Mayor of Indian Head. What an asset she will be, along with all of our other Board Members. e must say goodbye to two Board members - Ron Newman

& Diane Dolan. We send our gratitude for the years served on the Board and we wish them both well.

<u>SIXTH KEY ELEMENT</u> - <u>DISC</u> - The Sask Voice has donated \$500 to the DISC Committee to make sure we are still supporting that Committee and this important initiative continues until the SAID program has been thoroughly implemented in the best interest of people with disabilities

SEVENTH KEY ELEMENT - GUIDE TO INDEPENDENT LIVING

 Our "Guide to Independent Living" is outdated. So with the assistance from one of our Board members, namely Terri Sleeva we will update this guide and apply for funding from other sources for printing costs.

<u>EIGHTH KEY ELEMENT</u> - <u>WEBSITE</u> - As with everything technical - it goes out of date quickly - usually within 6 months what was recent then is now obsolete. With that in mind our website must be upgraded. We are working on that to keep costs down and remain current.

<u>NINETH KEY ELEMENT</u> - <u>MASTER CHARGE OR VISA</u> - We will look into receiving payments & donations by credit card. The "Square" seems to be the implement to use.

<u>TENTH KEY ELEMENT</u> - <u>INDIVVIDUALIZED FUNDING</u> - The initial paper that was written was unacceptable, it is been rewritten. The Individualized Funding Committee wishes to have a meeting with Dustin Duncan.

June 10th is the date set for a meeting with Minister Draude, Minister of Social Services. A review of the Voice's programing; as well as introduce her to the direction the Voice is proposing to the Ministry.

On that note, I would like to thank Marg Friesen & Bev Duncan for keeping me informed and on the "straight & narrow" - and I would also like to thank the staff in the office for keeping the doors open and the lights on. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

This past year has been full of changes, adjustments, and of taking stock of where we are as an organization. It also has had its share of tension and surprises, but overall it marked a positive transition point in many of our key relationships and role within the disability community.

Each new year brings additional challenges and, without a SVOP doubt, our hands-on approach allowed us to quickly direct our limited resources where they were most needed. The success we achieve stems from our fundamental dedication, responsiveness and our flexibility in continuously adapting to changing needs of our clientele and our ability to obtain resources to meet the demand on our services on a timely basis.

I was hired in June of 2013 to assist with revitalizing the membership, maintaining operations of the organization, fund development and growing the Board of Directors. Needless to say we have been quite busy. Highlights are attached to this report.

Difficulty in securing project or core funding in today's climate is very challenging. SVOPD has submitted a proposal to the Ministry of Social Services to enhance our service delivery to include trusteeship and advocacy and to retain core funding for office operations. Our funding from the Council of Canadians with Disabilities has been cut by 65%. 2014-2015 will be the last year for core funding since the program has been eliminated from the federal budget.

With the reduction of funding, we do not have a lot of travel funds so we can't meet obligations provincially has we have in the past. Our profile has suffered because of this. The website will help a lot, but without the face-to-face meetings, and the loss of profile there is a real concern that this organization will not survive. With recent funding cuts across the country to consumer/peer organizations, it leads me to wonder if there will be any future funding for consumer-driven, grass roots organizations. We have implemented a fundraising committee who will along with staff can seek other opportunities for funding:

i.e. corporations, community, and private to continue our efforts for sustainability.

SVOPD has done a stellar job and has accomplished much over the past 40 years. Strong leadership, a commitment to improving systems and dedicated staff – are what is needed as we move forward in implementing the new strategies to ensuring consumers' voices continue to be heard. The momentum and our improving relationship with government provide significant opportunities. Given SVOPDs track record, I am very confident that we will succeed.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Saskatchewan Voice Of People With Disabilities Inc.

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Saskatchewan Voice Of People With Disabilities Inc., which comprise the statement of financial position as at March 31, 2013 and March 31, 2012, and the statements of operation and cumulative surplus and cash flow statement for the years then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audits. I conducted my audits in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified audit opinion.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many non-profit organizations, Saskatchewan Voice Of People With Disabilities Inc. derives part of its revenue from the general public, the completeness and classification of which are not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly my verification of these transactions was limited to accounting for the amounts recorded in the records of the organization and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to the revenues, surplus for the year, assets and cumulative surplus.

Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except for the effects, if any, of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Saskatchewan Voice Of People With Disabilities Inc. as at March 31, 2013 and March 31, 2012 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

SASKATCHEWAN VOICE OF PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES INC. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS MARCH 31, 2013

1. Description of Organization and Incorporation Status

Saskatchewan Voice of People With Disabilities Inc. provides programs and services to meet the needs of handicapped persons and promotes public awareness of the needs of handicapped persons.

Saskatchewan Voice Of People With Disabilities Inc. is incorporated under the Non-Profit Corporations Act of Saskatchewan. Under present legislation, no income taxes are payable on the reported income of such operations. The organization is a registered charity and is exempt from income taxes.

2. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and include the following significant accounting policies:

Revenue Recognition

The organization follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Capital assets

Capital assets are expensed in the year of purchase. \$1,668 of capital assets were expensed in 2012 (2011 - NIL).

Management estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. By their nature, these estimates are subject to measurement uncertainty and the effect on the financial statements of changes in such estimates in future periods could be significant.

Financial instruments

The Saskatchewan Voice Of People With Disabilities Inc. initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value. It subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

Financial assets subsequently measured at amortized cost include cash and accounts receivable. Financial liabilities subsequently measured at amortized cost include accounts payable.

3. Line of credit

A line of credit exists with Royal Bank of Canada with an authorized credit limit of \$20,000. NIL (2012- NIL) of the credit line was utilized at March 31, 2013. The line of credit bears interest at prime plus 1.35% per year.

4. Deferred revenue

Funding received relating to specific projects has been deferred and will be recognized as revenue in the year the related project or event occurs.

5. Lease commitment

A lease agreement exists with Niesner Properties Inc. for the premises at 984 Albert Street, Regina, Saskatchewan. A five year term commenced August 2009 requiring monthly payments of \$1,135 plus GST.

6. Economic dependence

The Saskatchewan Voice Of People With Disabilities Inc. receives significant revenue in grants from the Ministry of Social Services and the Council of Canadians with Disabilities. As a result, the organization is dependent upon the continuance of these grants to maintain operations at their current level.

7. Financial instruments

Saskatchewan Voice Of People With Disabilities Inc. is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. The following analysis provides a measure of the Saskatchewan Voice Of People With Disabilities Inc.'s exposure and concentrations at March 31, 2013:

Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a party may default on their financial obligations, or if there is a concentration of financial obligations which have similar economic characteristics that could be similarly affected by changes in economic conditions, such that the Organization could incur a financial loss. The Organization is exposed to credit risk with respect to cash and accounts receivable. The Organization manages its credit risk by placing cash with major financial institutions. Credit risk for accounts receivable is managed by the credit quality and diverse debtor base and creating an allowance for bad debts where applicable. There has been no change from credit risk exposure from 2012.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Organization may not be able to meet a demand for cash or fund its obligations as they come due or not being able to liquidate assets in a timely manner at a reasonable price. The Organization is exposed to liquidity risk with respect to its accounts payable and accrued liabilities but manages its liquidity risk by holding assets that can be readily converted into cash. There has been no change from liquidity risk exposure from 2012.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is a type of market risk that refers to the risk that the fair value of financial instruments or future cash flows associated with the instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates. The Organization is exposed to interest rate risk with respect to its cash its effect on interest income. Fluctuations in interest rates do not have a significant effect on cash due to the fact that interest income is not a major percentage of total revenue. There has been no change from interest risk exposure from 2012.

8. Adoption of Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations

Effective April 1, 2012, the Organization adopted Canadian accounting standards for not-forprofit organizations. These are the Organization's first financial statements prepared in accordance with these accounting standards and the transitional provisions of Section 1501, First time adoption by not-for-profit organizations, have been applied. Section 1501 requires retrospective application of the accounting standards with certain elective exemptions and limited retrospective exceptions. The accounting policies set out in the significant accounting policy have been applied in preparing the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2013 and the comparative information presented in these financial statements for March 31, 2012. The Organization issued financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2012 using generally accepted accounting principles prescribed by the pre-changeover standards of the CICA Handbook - Accounting. The adoption of accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations had no impact on the previously reported assets, liabilities and surplus of the Organization and accordingly, no adjustments have been recorded in the comparative statements of financial position and the statements of operations and cumulative surplus. In addition, as no changes were required, an opening statement of financial position at April 1, 2011, the Organization's date of transition, has not been presented.

9. Comparative figures

Certain prior year figures have been reclassified to conform to the current year's presentation.
